This section outlines the key **learning outcomes** for schools to focus on.

Enterprise Education supports the development of the knowledge and understanding, skills and attributes that young people require to thrive in their future working lives.

The following learning outcomes have been identified as the key ones for schools to focus on within the three strands of enterprise education

- **Enterprise Knowledge and Understanding**
- **Enterprise Skills**
- **Enterprise Attributes**
